

Common questions answered

Will access to my property be impacted during construction?

Some works, such as road resurfacing, may require temporary disruption to your driveway access. We will provide advance notice ahead of any impactful works starting and will assist you with property access during these works.

How will the traffic signals phasing operate?

During peak times, the phasing of the traffic signals will be controlled by the Brisbane Metropolitan Traffic Management Centre (BMTMC) who will monitor the operation of the intersection, making changes to the phasing, as required, to ensure traffic flows as efficiently and effectively as possible. Outside peak times, the traffic lights will react to vehicles as they get to the intersection. Vehicle sensor loops will be installed under the road surface to detect when a vehicle is waiting at the lights. At project completion, the intersection will be monitored and changes to the signal phasing can be made, if required.

Will the intersection be monitored?

A surveillance camera will be installed on top of one of the traffic signal lanterns which will be used to monitor the intersection, to ensure it is operating as intended. When required, the footage will be reviewed by the Brisbane Metropolitan Traffic Management Centre (BMTMC).

How will motorists on Sexton Street know there are traffic signals ahead?

A permanent 'Traffic Signal Ahead' sign will be installed on Sexton Street on approach to the intersection. When the lights are first activated, a variable message sign board (VMS) will be temporarily located on Sexton Street to help motorists adjust to the change.

Why are the yellow no stopping lines needed?

The new yellow no stopping lines prevent on-street parking near to the intersection and provide visibility for road users travelling through the intersection. They also ensure the traffic lanes operate efficiently and effectively without a parked car impeding traffic flow.
